



## Introduction



Here are photos from two short trips north from Toronto to go on autumn colour day cruises.

Both the 2017 and 2019 trips featured the same three afternoon cruises.

In 2017 I travelled alone, and found that the autumn colours weren't vibrant yet.


My friend Chris Paton joined me in 2019 to share photographic duties, and we were rewarded with more developed colour.

Tour boat operators in Ontario's "cottage country" operate until just after Canada's Thanksgiving (second Monday in October) to showcase the spectacular vistas as leaves, trees, and forests turn colour.

But global warming is delaying these changes. The deep, saturated colours usually emerge after there has been a heavy frost. Even in the absence of that the views are spectacular.

These trips also offer a chance to see a bit of these central Ontario communities, and to explore some of the history of tourism in Muskoka.

It's also great to escape the hustle and bustle and noise of the big city, and to enjoy the fresh air, the rugged landscape, and the more relaxed approach to life.





Parry Sound First it's north to Parry Sound, the main town on the eastern side of Georgian Bay, with the largest natural harbour on the Bay.



Parry Sound Parry Sound developed from the mid-1800s as a lumbering centre and transportation hub.



Parry Sound Both national railway companies, CN and CP, use this long trestle bridge to move freight between eastern and western Canada. Busy!



Parry Sound Georgian Bay Airways provides services for business, for hunting and fishing expeditions, and for sightseeing.

But the port was the key to the town's development.

Fleets of steamers operated from here beginning in the 1860s.





Parry Sound A practical combination. A theatre and concert hall for the arts, and a tribute to the town's famous hockey player.



Parry Sound Bobby Orr is one of the greatest hockey players of all time. He revolutionized the game in his 1960s and 70s seasons with the Boston Bruins and Chicago Blackhawks.



**Island Queen**But we're here for the Island Queen Cruise, a 3-hour tour out into Georgian Bay, circling Parry Island, one of the larger islands in the Great Lakes.



Island Queen The 550-passenger Island Queen was designed for this sightseeing route, with easy maneuverability and a shallow draft. It was built in Canada in 1990 by Algoma Steel.

Bracebridge At Bracebridge the Lady Muskoka cruise departs from right behind the Quality Inn hotel.



This cruise meanders down the Muskoka River and then circles around the upper part of Lake Muskoka.



As we go down the river we glimpse a magical wonderland (actually a children's theme park) through the trees.



It's Santa's Village, his summer home on the 45th Parallel, half way between the equator and the North Pole.



We see some log cabin cottages, ...



... echoes of earlier centuries.



And we see some autumn colour, but only dimly because it's raining.



When we get out into the lake the rain makes for a dreary day. It rained on this tour both times.



At least the second time we get to see the summer homes on Millionaires Row more clearly.


There's lots to see in town too. The Muskoka Discovery Centre preserves the heritage of the Muskoka district, including its development as Ontario's "cottage country".



Muskoka tourism started with large resort hotels, complete with dance halls, croquet lawns, and tennis courts. There were about 30 such establishments by 1879.



Steam navigation on the lakes began in 1866. After the railway reached Gravenhurst in 1875 fleets of steamers ferried throngs of vacationers throughout the lakes.



The Centre has extensive exhibits about the steamer era. It also showcases the next phase: private vacation homes and personal water transportation.



The first summer cottages appeared in the late 19th century. They were the preserve of the wealthy, who brought their sense of style, and deep pockets.



Before highways a boat was a practical necessity, but it could be elegant too. Muskoka developed a custom boat building industry famous for style and quality craftsmanship.



This is North America's largest collection of in-water classic antique wooden boats.







"All the boats are privately owned and are on display due to the generosity of their owners."



Wenonah II Today's cruise will be aboard the Wenonah II, named after the first steamship to sail on Lake Muskoka – in 1866.

Wenonah II And it's temping to categorize or name the "cottages".









